

**INDIAN DEPREDACTIONS.**—We are informed that on Saturday last, upwards of twenty horses and mules were stolen from the ranch of Thomas J. Flynn, and the immediate neighborhood, by the McCloud and Pitt River Indians. A party of whites started in pursuit of the thieves, and after some days hunting, succeeded in recovering a few of the animals. The remainder had been killed by the savages.

We also learn that a party of Indians, in the early part of the week, run off seven or eight very valuable wagon mules,—belonging to Messrs. Tomlinson & Wood, of this town, from a point one or two miles from this place on the Middletown road. Immediate pursuit was made, however, and all of the animals recovered. One of the mules was quite badly wounded with an arrow; the remainder were uninjured.

We are informed by Mr. Flynn that a company of forty men start to-day for McCloud River, for the purpose of severely chastising the thieves.
