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From Yreka.

We are indebted to Jack Horsley, of Cram, Rogers & Co's Express, for Yreka news, and for the *Mountain Herald* of the 22d.

The Indians who have been so long confined in the Cave, between Yreka and Jacksonville, have finally sued for peace. Lieut. Bonnycastle and others from Fort Jones, recently visited the Cave and had a conference with some of the chiefs. The Indians have concluded to leave that region of country if they can find a suitable place elsewhere to live. A delegation of some of the tribes will pass through this place in a few days on their way to the Sacramento Valley, to select a location. During their confinement many have died from diseases engendered by the dampness of the cave.

Farmers are busy throughout the valleys of Siskiyou county. Since last Fall, many thousand acres of land, especially in Scotts' Valley, have been enclosed by fence and placed under the influence of the plow. An unusual amount of wheat has been sown. The home produce will more than supply the markets of Siskiyou with flour. The production of edible roots will be much larger than formerly. In fact the farmers have very sanguine expectations of an abundant harvest of every thing of the vegetable kind.

A few days since, a piece of gold bearing quartz was found about two miles from Yreka, weighing about sixty-four ounces, and worth about three hundred dollars. Miners generally are doing well.
