A Russian Prince in a Fix.—Captain Whiting of the Sonora reports that when at Rio Janerio from 2d to 8th April, there was a Russian prince with his yacht in harbor and the English Admiral of the station would not permit him to leave the port. On two or three occasions when the yacht got under way, the British steamer immediately got up her steam and took position outside the harbor to prevent her getting out.
