STATE CLAIM FOR MONEY SPENT IN DEFENCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE FROM INDIAN AGGRESSION.—General McDougal, from the Committee on Military Affairs, has submitted to Congress an able and comprehensive report in favor of paying to the State of California her claim for money paid for defending her territories from Indian aggression. We have received a copy of this interesting report from Mr. McDougal. He makes out a strong case, and if he can ever get a vote upon the claim, may succeed in getting it passed. Mr. McDougal presents a long array of precedents that are immediately in point, and which are conclusive as to the past practice of paying all such Indian war claims, when it was shown satisfactorily that the State had expended the money. If our members, in conjunction with Dr. Pierce, succeed in getting this claim through Congress, they will have done much towards relieving

ing the State from her financial burdens and in obtaining for her that justice which is her due from the General Government.

CALIFORNIA STATISTICS.—The Rev. Mr. Phillips, in a sermon delivered lately in Stockton, gives the following interesting statistics in relation to the population, &c., of California. They are copied from the Journal:

The population of California four years ago, was 35,000, of which number 17,000, or one-half, were females. At the present time, there are 300,000, making an annual increase of 75,000. The sexes, which were about equally divided four years ago, now stand in great disproportion, as
