

Gulch, some two or three hundred yards above the mill of Messrs. Palmer, Cook & Co.— This mill, we believe, is being erected by Messrs. Bondurant & Co., and is to be driven by water power, supplied from Stockton creek.

Messrs. Kelly & Keefe are engaged in putting up Arastars for grinding the quartz in the vein recently opened by them on Long Gulch, further prospecting having satisfied them of its richness.

Many portions of this county are completely covered with a perfect net work of gold bearing quartz veins, most of which could be made available if a supply of water for motive power could be obtained, and that this can be procured from Artesian wells, or by means of a ditch or canal from the head of the Merced or San Joaquin, needs no demonstration.

It only requires a little energy and perseverance to accomplish such works, and then the objection which has hitherto operated against quartz speculations, viz: the great expense of steam power, be obviated, and our county occupy the position which belongs to it—that of the Empire County of California.—*Mariposa Chronicle.*

**INDIAN RESERVATION ON THE FRENZO.—** We learn that Mr. Henley, the Superintendent of Indian Affairs, has leased the Adobe House and Ranch of Capt. Vinsonhaler on the Frenzo, and intends locating there for the present, all the Indians originally belonging in that section, many of whom have heretofore refused to remove to the Tejon. We have not the least doubt but that this project will prove of great service in inducing many of them to adopt some of the habits of civilization, and eventually end in their permanent removal to the Tejon Reservation, beyond the influence of the white population, the better portion of whom desire their removal to some place where they may live by themselves, undisturbed by the vices of a class found in every country, who pander to the corruptions of the Indians for their own base and selfish purposes.—*Mariposa Chrn.*
