**From Calaveras.**

From the Calaveras Chronicle, of October 28th, we extract the following items:

**BENEFIT.**—Lee & Marshall, proprietors of the National Circus, with their accustomed liberality, have tendered a benefit to the fire company of Mokelumne Hill, to take place on Friday evening next.

The digging in the vicinity of the Hill are still very rich. Wells, Fargo & Co. have shipped during the present month the large sum of \$95,000.

**INDIAN AGENCY.**—B. F. Marshall, of Murphy's, has been appointed by Col. Henley to the Indian Agency for Calaveras and Amador counties.

**DEEP DIGGINGS.**—About two years ago, several parties prospected a hill in our immediate vicinity, at that time named Sport Hill, which was afterwards abandoned, as containing no gold. Lately some enterprising miners again struck into the hill, and we understand are likely to meet with success. We are informed by a practical miner, that in a very short time diggings will be struck in that locality equal to any ever yet worked in our neighborhood. It is stated that the hills along Chile Gulch are paying very richly, as may be known from the large number of tunnels which are now being worked in that locality.

**TABLE MOUNTAIN WATER COMPANY.**—This enterprise is now complete, the water having been introduced in the diggings around Cave City this week. The Water is taken out of O'Neil's and San Antonio Creeks, and will supply a very rich section of country, extending over twenty miles. The Table Mountain Flats, the rich hills and gulches in and around Cave City, upper and lower McKinnies, Willow Creek, Old and French Gulches and the rich mining ground in the vicinity of San Andres, will be supplied by this canal.
