

FORMAN'S RANCH.—The Water Company, near this place, sustained considerable injury from the late flood, and was completely demolished—producing a temporary respite from labor among miners, which will be immediately remedied by the speedy construction of a new and substantial aqueduct.

SUCCESSFUL HUNTING.—Mr. D. H. Ashaw, a practical miner, and a keen sportsman, who resides near the Bay State Ranch, killed four fine deer last Saturday. He took his game to San Andres, expecting to dispose of it; but finding no choice venison at a discount in that community he returned, and sold the lot to Mr. Medina, of the Bay State Ranch, for twenty cents per pound. A pretty good day's work, that. Two of the deer were killed at one shot, the ball passing through one and lodging in the other.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT FROM HUMBOLDT—FIVE WHITE MEN MURDERED BY THE INDIANS.—By the arrival of the steamer Humboldt, from Humboldt Bay, we have received some highly exciting news. The long expected outbreak of the Indians against the whites in that quarter, has finally taken place.

Information had reached Union on the 15th ult., the County Seat of Humboldt, before the steamer left, that five white men were murdered on the 13th inst., at Orleans, near the Klamath Indians. On the receipt of this news, Col. Buchanan immediately sent a detachment of 25 U. S. troops, under the command of Lieut. H. W. Judah, to the Bar.

A volunteer company was also organized at Union and started for the same place. Much excitement prevailed, and considerable difficulty is apprehended, as the Indians have seized all of their squaws and children off the mountains. The names of two of the murdered men were Wheeler and O'Neil, both of whom were traders.—*News.*

The Sacramento *Union* says that the above intelligence has been fully confirmed by a letter received on yesterday, by the Representative from Humboldt county.
