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Indian War on the Klamath.

We are indebted to Cram, Rogers & Co.'s Express for the *Mountain Herald* Extra, of the 21st inst., from which we learn that the Indians on Klamath are in a state of open warfare against the whites. A letter from Bestville, dated January 18th, says :

“ Four men have been killed, several wounded and more are missing, among the latter is James Strawbridge, the Expressman from Trinidad.

“ The difficulty grew out of the lawless acts of certain persons who were in the habit of forcing the squaws. Sam Harris, a few weeks ago, shot an Indian for attempting to prevent him from ravishing a squaw claimed by the Indian. Such men deserve the rope. But as innocent men are made to suffer, the Indians must be subdued. Capt. Best, M. Luddy, and about twenty others, started this morning to the scene of action, among whom was Dr. Willard—a surgeon.”

We have news of the same difficulty, by the way of Humboldt Bay and San Francisco. Col. Buchaban had sent a detachment of twenty-five U. S. troops, under the command of Lieut. H. W. Judah, to the assistance of the whites.
