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 The communication of "A Miner" would find a place in our columns under different circumstances. Its publication now would be ill-timed, for the reason that it might create prejudice in the public mind against certain persons most interested. Remarks that are proper to publish after the adjournment of a court, may be very unsuitable for publication preceding the commencement of a term.

THE NOUZE INDIANS.—Several men and forty or fifty squaws with their children, belonging to this tribe of Indians, are now on the ranch of Mr. Job Dye, and are desirous of making a treaty with the whites. Their rancheria was recently set upon by a number of whites, under the impression that one of their tribe had shot a white man, and many of them killed. They therefore ask to be protected by the whites against the whites. They also deny that the white man was shot by one of their tribe.

MINERS' MEMORIAL.—Senator Sprague presented to the Senate the memorial of the miners of Shasta County, praying to be relieved from the presence of the Chinese. The memorial was received with such favor by the members, as to justify the hope that something will be done during the present session to effectually remove the Chinese from the mines. We expect a report from the special committee of five, to whom the memorial was referred, in the course of a few days.
