A motion to reconsider the vote by which the bill went to a third reading prevailed.

The bill was then laid on the table, and the Senate adjourned.

ASSEMBLY.

The House met pursuant to adjournment, Speaker Stowe in the Chair.

Journal read and approved.

Mr. Arrington introduced a bill for the relief of citizens in Klamath county, who have been engaged in subduing Indians.

Mr. Baker introduced a bill to provide for constructing a wagon road from Stockton to the Eastern boundary line of this State. The bill provides that the road shall pass through the county seats of Stanislaus, Merced, Tulare, Los Angeles, San Bernardino, and thence to connect with the U. S. Road leading to Salt Lake. The bill was referred to a special committee of one from each of the counties through which the road passes.

Also, a bill to authorize the formation of the county of Kern. This county is to be formed out of part of Tulare.

Also, a bill to define the northern boundary line of Tulare county.

Also, a bill to repeal an act so far as the law of roads applies to Tulare county.

Also, a bill to amend an act relating to the construction of a canal from Tulare Lake to the San Joaquin river.

Several bills were reported back from standing and special committees, their passage recommended, and placed on file to take their regular order.

The petition of S. M. Miles, for relief for medicines and food furnished needy immigrants in 1849 and 1850, the committee reported adversely to paying anything.

Mr. Ferrel, to whom was referred the bill providing for the salaries of District Attorneys, desired that the delegations from the different counties should report to him the amount of the salary they wished fixed for this officer, in order to make a perfect bill that would pass without amendment.
