CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE.

SIXTH SESSION.

SENATE.

SACRAMENTO, Wednesday, March 14th.

Senate met pursuant to adjournment; Lieut. Gov. Pardy in the Chair.

After the reading of the journal, Mr. Tuttle obtained the unanimous consent to have the general Supervisor's bill taken up, and moved that the Senate recede from one of its amendments, which had been non-concurred in by the Assembly (the words of the amendment were, "and also to approve or reject the official bonds of county and township officers"), that is, giving the bonds of supervisors to approve or reject. The Senate refused to recede.

On motion of Mr. Whiting, a committee of conference was appointed.

Mr. Hook, from the Committee on Indian Affairs, to whom was referred a message of the Governor's referring to the Indian War Debt, recommended that no action be taken on the same; also, adverse to the payment of the payroll of the San Francisco Rangers, who were not found ever to have rendered any services to the State.

Mr. Sprague presented a minority report, from a select committee, to whom was referred the proceedings of a convention of miners, held at Shasta, recommending the adoption of some measures to check Chinese immigration.

The bill to declare the tenure of lands in the mining districts of this State was passed—
Ayes 18; nays 8.

On motion, the Senate resumed the consideration of the bill to provide for certifying and removing certain cases from the courts of this State to the United States Circuit Courts, and to remove by writ of error certain cases from
