SACRAMENTO, March 21, 1855.
 Lieut. Gov. Purdy in the Chair.

Mr. Whiting, from the Committee on the Judiciary, reported a bill regulating the fees of officers, and recommended its passage. Ordered to be printed, and made the special order of the day for Wednesday next.

The chairman of the Committee on Commerce and Education, submitted a bill in reference to pilots and pilot charges, the object of which will be to make San Francisco rendezvous for whaling vessels.

The Assembly bill to provide for the indigent sick in each county, was discussed at length. Sent back to Assembly with concurrence.

Mr. Crenshaw, of Nevada, presented a bill for the encouragement of railroads in California—also to construct a wagon road from Sacramento Valley to the Sierra Nevada mountains.

An act amendatory of an act for the protection of Indians was passed.

An act amendatory of an act regulating marriages. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Assembly bill authorizing the funding of the outstanding Stockton scrip. Passed.

Assembly bill authorizing commissioners of the Funded Debt of Tuolumne county, to issue duplicate bonds of said county, lost at sea, payable to J. W. Dwyneil. Passed.

Mr. Day presented a bill for the construction of railroads. Referred to committee on corporations. Senate adjourned.
