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From Trinity.

The Trinity Times of the 7th inst., tirges the establishment of an Indian Reservation in Trinity county. It believes this the only way to protect citizens, and at the same time promote the civilization of the Indians.

Ridgeville is the name of a new town that has suddenly grown up about sixteen miles north-east of Weaverville, near Stewart's Fork of the Trinity river. The Times says of it:

It is situated in the keart of one of the richest and most extensive mining sections of this county; and, although it is but a few weeks since the town was laid out, it contains already. as we understand, some five of six hundred inhabitants. From all we can learn in regard to the place, we are inclined to the opinion that it is designed to be a point of considerable importance, as the diggings in the neighborhood are represented to be of sufficient extent and richness to afford remunerative employment to thousands. The facilities for procuring water are said to be unsurpassed by any mining locality, as there is scarcely a point within a range of several miles that cannot be easily and abundantly supplied from the different tributaries of Trinity rivet. The gold found here is of a coarse character-many pieces having been taken out weighing from four to six onnces.

We understand that Messrs. Wheeler & Co., and Messrs. Tolley & Co., have completed their races, which bring the water from the East Fork of the North Fork on these diggings. The races are six miles in length, and will furnish about three hundred sluice heads of water. They were both finished in five weeks from the commencement of the work. The water was introduced
