





 We learn from the *Shasta Courier* that two men, William Cochran and Jesse Brown, were recently murdered by the Indians, on the south fork of the Cottonwood. It is said that Brown had with him about one thousand dollars, and Cochran four or five hundred. It was the freedom with which the Indians spent this money at Farr's trading post that led to the discovery of the crime. Messrs. Farr and others succeeded in capturing the squaws of the murderers, who divulged the whole matter. They say that they carried wood to burn the murdered men, and then pounded their bones to powder, so that the whites should not find them. They furthermore state that this tribe has plenty of stock and money, and that they have, up to the present time, killed five white men.
