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FROM CRESCENT CITY.

From a copy of the *Crescent City Herald*, of the 23d of May, we take the following items of interest :

It has been discovered that a number of cattle have lately been killed by the Indians in our neighborhood. Some efforts were made to discover the guilty parties, but as yet without success. A few have been brought in who confess to having eaten the beef, but charge the killing of the cattle on others.

P. S.—While we are going to press, one or two Indians who admit of having killed one beef, are being tried by a jury.

A company, we understand, has been formed in this city for whaling purposes. Our harbor is said to afford great facilities for this business, and the frequency with which these inhabitants of the deep show themselves near our shores, certainly augurs success to such an undertaking. The company have good boats and the necessary implements all on hand.

From Mr. Cornwall, who arrived in town on Saturday, we learn that the party in pursuit of the Indians who had killed J. B. Hills, on the South Fork of Indian Creek, and rifled the camp of provisions and valuables, are on the track of the marauders. At Sailor Diggings information was received that the Indians had been skulking about in the neighborhood of Deer Creek Valley, (tributary of Illinois river) and a portion of the company was immediately detailed to ascertain the fact.
