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Later from Humboldt Bay.

By an arrival at San Francisco, on Thursday night, we are in the receipt of the Humboldt *Times* of the 11th inst., from which we extract the following interesting news from the North. Speaking of the recent Indian outrages in that quarter, the *Times* says :

We learn from Mr. Lemuel Lakin, who arrived in town, on Tuesday last, from Scott's Bar, Scott river, that on the 27th July, the Indians killed twelve men, and wounded two others, on the Klamath, near Scott's river. On Friday afternoon they went to Buckeye bar, and killed three men who were at work; and from there they went to Peckham's ranch, where, on Saturday morning, they killed four packers. Between Buckeye and Peckham's they killed five and wounded two others. Mr. Lakin saw the wounded men, one of whom was supposed to be wounded mortally. It was said to be Klamath Indians who committed the murders. Two of them were captured at Yreka on the 30th ult., and hung on the 31st. A large amount of ammunition was found upon them, which, they said, was furnished them by negroes living in Yreka, who had Indian wives. The negroes were lynched, and ordered to leave the country. On the 30th the Volunteers killed three Indians on the Klamath, where all work has been suspended for the present.

The *Times* says : On the mornings of the 30th and 31st of July, and 1st and 6th of Aug. we had severe frosts; that of the 6th, in some places on the prairie, injured young vegetable very much.
