AN UNMIGATED ATROCITY.—We have been shown an affidavit of Mr. Charles Thurman relative to an unprovoked murder of a sick Indian boy, about 15 years of age, at Hamburg Bar, by one William Maul, on Tuesday last. It will be recollected that the Indians of Scott Valley at the time of the late Indian difficulties gave up their arms, and placed themselves under the protection of Capt. Judah, who still has charge of them. This boy was one of the tribe, and at the time of the Indian outbreak happened to be at Hamburg sick and unable to remove to the valley. He was left at Hamburg in charge of his mother and sister, whose intention it was to convey him to the valley as soon as he should be able to walk so far. On Tuesday evening this man Maul went to the house where the boy was stopping, and after ordering him to run, shot him in the back; the ball lodged in the breast, causing his death in a few minutes. Three others, named George Usery, McLane and Gillespie, it was stated in the affidavit, were abettors, and encouragers. Such an exhibition of unwonted brutality, by persons calling themselves white men, is painful to contemplate; and an outrage of the kind could never suggest itself to the mind of any other than the most abandoned and cowardly. We sincerely trust that the parties may be brought to justice, and receive legal punishment in addition to the just censure of our citizens.

FOREIGN COIN.—Since the late war upon the franc pieces, many complaints have been made of the great quantity of other foreign coin forced upon the market. If there is any doubt on this subject, the skeptic can satisfy himself by obtaining change, at almost any place of business, for five dollars; and the result will probably be a surplusage of rupees, Peruvian silver, and other foreign money, over the United States coin. The former pass for more than their actual value, and there is no reason why they should not share the fate of
