MURDERED.—An Illinoistown Indian, called "Tubbs," attempted to murder a couple of Chinamen on Sunday evening last, on the trail leading from Christian Valley to the North Fork of the American River. He shot one dead and wounded the other so severely that he is not expected to live. The citizens of Christian Valley succeeded in securing "Tubbs" and tried him by a jury of their own, who condemned him to death. He was hanged about 3 o'clock, p. m., on Wednesday, to a limb of a tree. After he was cut down, a portion of his tribe took the body for burial to Bear River.

"Tubbs" has heretofore been guilty of murdering a Chinaman, and has at last met a deserved fate for his murderous propensities.

We learn that a party of citizens have gone to see Weimar, the chief, and get him to find out and deliver up the other Indians who were associated with "Tubbs" in the murder.
