THE FREZNO RESERVATION.—We learn from the Mariposa Gazette that Judge M. B. Lewis has recently been appointed Indian Agent under Col. Henley, and has entered upon his duties at the Indian Reservation on the Frezno. Judge Lewis is no doubt better qualified to fill this position than any other man in this section of the State, from the fact of his having been a resident of that locality since '49, and having been more or less connected with Mr. Savage through all of his difficulties with the Indians, rendering material aid in restoring peace, thus acquiring an experience in such matters that no other man could possess, unless he had been similarly situated. Besides this, the Judge has always been a great favorite with the Indians, and notwithstanding his intercourse with them, since the death of Savage, has been simply as a private citizen, he has been looked up to by them as their "Great Chief," and now they hail his appointment to take charge of and look after them with great joy and satisfaction. This certainly bids fair for the future, in reference to our Indian relations. We venture the assertion that Col. Henley could not have made a better selection for this station. or one that would have given more general satisfaction to all interested, or given more pleasure to the friends of Judge Lewis, whose names are legion.
