**INDIAN FIGHT NEAR RED BLUFFS—TWENTY-FIVE INDIANS KILLED.**—A correspondent of the *Sacramento Union* at Red Bluffs writes, under date of Oct. 21, that he had just heard, through Mr. Bumpis, of a fight between the Indians about twenty-five miles from that place, in which some twenty-five were killed. He says that the Indians are committing robberies and murders in all directions in that vicinity, and suggests, pertinently, that something should be done to protect the people of the north, particularly the women and children, in this connection. He asserts that it is unsafe for a white man to sleep out of his house, and that if something is not done by the authorities, the people will wage war on their own hook. A company of volunteers has been drilling at Red Bluffs for some time past, and is held in readiness to attend the call of the Governor.
