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## Summary of News.

A. M. Case, well known in Sacramento and El Dorado counties, committed forgeries at the Bay to the amount of five or six thousand dollars and made his escape on the last Nicaragua steamer.

Gen. Denver's letter, tendering his resignation as Secretary of State, was handed to the Governor on Thursday. The resignation is to take effect on the 5th of November.

McCarthy, who killed Poole at Curtisville, was convicted of murder, at Sonora, Tuolumne county, last week.

Micky Free, one of the murderers of Mr. Howe, of Lake Valley, and Crane who killed Miss Newman, near Ringgold, were hung at Coloma yesterday.

An indignation meeting of the passengers who came up on the steamer *Cortes*, on her last trip, was held in San Francisco, on Monday last. Wonder how much they made by it.

Some thirty or forty persons united themselves with the Methodist Church, at Nevada, last week.

The barque *Hermoine* sailed from San Francisco on the 25th inst., for Valparaiso with a full cargo of flour.

Five more deserters escaped from the frigate *Independence* last Tuesday.

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**SEVERE ACCIDENT.**—On the 24th inst., a young man named Joseph Roilley, while engaged in mining near the Pine Grove House on the Jackson road, was severely injured by the caving of the bank. A compound fracture of the leg at the ancle joint was the result,—one of the bones pushing through the joint and lacerating the skin very badly. The other bone was broken about two inches above the joint—there was also a deep flesh wound in the thigh, which appeared to have been caused by falling on a pick.

Doctors G. K. Smith and J. W. Goodin were called and succeeded in adjusting the fractured leg, and at last accounts the wounded man was doing well.

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
