A MAGNIFICENT URN.—The most extraordinary work of art ever manufactured in this country, is now on exhibition at the book store of Massey & Finance, San Francisco. It is an Urn of solid silver, says the *Evening Journal*, weighing 137 pounds, and five feet in height, most splendidly carved, and the whole made of 2,600 silver Mexican dollars. It has required the labor of six artists for ten months to finish the work, which, as it stands, is valued at \$20,000. The designs were modelled by M. Magar.
