

at Sonora some time last week, between Eugene B. Drake, of Shaw's Flat, and Edward F. Hunter, of Sonora, in which Drake was shot in the arm. There appears to be great interest manifested by the rival parties in the matter at dispute, which is relative to mining claims. The Extra says that "great excitement has prevailed between the rival parties. Shaw's Flat has been convulsed to its centre, and the end of Table Mountain shaken to its very base. No occurrence bringing our miners in opposition to each other, has ever so largely and so generally absorbed the feelings of the parties contending, as this Table Mountain and Shaw's Flat disagreement." It also furnishes the testimony in the examination of Hunter, and adds, in a postscript: "As we go to press, we learn that Drake's symptoms have assumed a very unfavorable appearance. Mortification has set in, and a second amputation is necessary, which will have to be made at the shoulder joint. This will be a last resort. It is now generally feared that death will ensue. Mr. Hunter has been rearrested and brought before the Judges of the Court of Sessions. His bail has been increased to \$3,000."

THE INDIANS.—The California *Express* learns from Col. Henley, Indian Agent, that for a few days he has been gathering the Indians from Bear River, across to the Yuba, including those at Nevada, Grass Valley, Rough and Ready, and along Deer Creek. Nearly all of those scattered along the Yuba, on both sides, for a distance of twenty miles, have been gathered in, together with their chiefs and head men, and on Monday they were crossed over the Yuba, at Long Bar, numbering in all, men, women, and children, one hundred and sixty-five. The number will probably be increased between the Yuba and Sewell's Ranch to two

between the two and seven hundred, who will be in a few days, quietly located at Nomee Lackee, where everything is provided for their reception, and where there are abundant supplies for the winter.

VALUATION OF PROPERTY IN SACRAMENTO.—

The Board of equalization has submitted to the Council of Sacramento, the assessment roll of personal property and real estate in that City. The *Union* says that they have raised the valuation of real estate \$342,069, and of personal property, including mortgages, \$831,265; and reduced the valuation of improvements \$109,435—making a total valuation of property within the city, of \$7,617,785, classified as follows: real estate, \$3,589,825—improvements, \$1,380,000—personal property, \$2,647,870. The tax thereon, as levied by the ordinance passed by the Council, last evening, will amount to \$209,489—distributed as follows; to pay current liabilities, \$152,355 70; sinking fund, \$38,088 02; common school purposes, \$19,044 46.

A PRINTER SHOT AT HIS CASE.—
