### Latest From the Oregon War.

The late papers from Oregon contain accounts of many atrocities as having been perpetrated by the savages; and there appears to have been an understanding among several tribes in different localities as to a general attack upon the whites at near the same time. Thus it shows that in the Rogue River valley serious outbreaks occur at the same time as in the vicinity of the Dalles, on the Columbia river.

Gov. Curry has made a requisition for one thousand volunteers, which has been cheerfully and speedily responded to, and at latest accounts this number of men had been armed and duly organized marched to the field of operations in the vicinity of the Dalles.

Several hundred regulars under Maj. Haller had previously been repulsed by a large band of Indians, with a loss of one fifth of the Major's command. The troops were praised for their bravery, and their skill in getting off as well as they did, managing a retreating battle for several hours.

The Governor of Washington Territory had also issued a proclamation and raised several companies, which were immediately marched into service.

Two man-of-war vessels in Puget Sound had been pretty well drained of their ammunition and arms to furnish volunteers already enlisted.

For once it seems our northern friends are fully aroused to the necessity of waging a war of extermination upon all the unfriendly savage tribes on their coast. That it will be done is now earnestly hoped, and that it *should* be done is no longer doubted, even by those who formerly were first and foremost in paying the Indians for their brutal outrages by presenting them with large outfits of blan-
