A fire occurred in San Francisco during the night of the 9th inst., which consumed four buildings, involving a loss of \$30,000.

A vein of Plumbago has been discovered in Calaveras county. A large proportion of iron is found in combination with the mineral.

The Stockton Argus says that city was never more prosperous than at present, and that the population of the southern mines is rapidly increasing.

Nineteen kilns of a superior quality of lime have lately been burned at Auburn.

A daily line of stages has been established between Mokelumne Hill, Sandy Gulch and West Point.

Isaac B. Wall, Speaker of the Assembly in 1852-'53, and latterly Collector at Monterey, and T. S. Williamson were found murdered about twenty-five miles from San Jose on the 11th inst.

The population of the State of New Jersey is 559,499, being an increase of 80,160 over the aggregate of the year 1850.

There are now fifteen hundred Indians on

the Nomee Lackee Reservation, which is superintended by Mr. Lovell the Deputy Agent.

Three men by the names of Robinson Dane, Arthur P. Haven, and Nathaniel Block, were killed near Ridgeville, Trinity county, on the 8th inst., by the caving of the bank of a deep cut which they were making.

The Stockton papers are urging the necessity of the immediate construction of a railroad from San Francisco through Stockton and Sacramento to Marysville.

According to a recent survey of the Hennes Pass through the Sierra Nevadas, the distance by that route is 97 miles from the Sink of the Humboldt to Forest City, and to Marysville 149 miles.

The Supreme Court resumed its sittings in Sacramento on the 12th inst.

The steamer Sea Bird was put on the Sacramento route on the 10th inst., to run in opposition to the Steam Navigation Co.

The mail steamer J. L. Stephens, arrived at San Francisco on yesterday morning.
