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Nomee Lackee Reservation.—Col. Henley, Indian Agent for California, who left the Reservation in Colusa county only a few day ago, furnishes the Sacramento Union with the subjoined items.

There are now fifteen hundred Indians on the Reservation, which is superintended over by Mr. Lovell, the Deputy Agent, Mr. Ford having gone over to the Coast. Every thing denotes business, activity and industry about the grounds, the Indians being assiduously engaged in hauling hay, sowing wheat, building houses, and preparing for the rainy season. The health of the Indians is good, and they appear contented and happy in their civilized home.

Special Indian Agent.—George M. Hanson, Esq. of Yuba City, has received the appointment of Special Indian Agent for Marysville and the region round about. Mr. H., says the Marysville Herald, has much influence with the Indians at Yuba City, and the appointment we consider to be a good one. Mr. Hanson is about to visit the Nomee Lackee Reservation, and intends to take some of the chiefs of the tribe at Yuba City with him, so that by personal inspection they can see how much their condition would be improved by a removal to that Reservation.

Gubernatorial Selections.—The State Journal says that Col. J. Neely Johnson has already made his selections for the offices of Sectetary of State and private Secretary, and that Gen. David S. Douglass, of San Joaquin, is to fill the former and W. H. Rhodes, of San Francisco, the latter office.
